## New Hub approach for our homes

To ensure that both our sheltered tenants and those living in street properties and blocks receive a responsive and fully connected service, we've reorganised our housing management across the Trust's properties to create new Hubs. Each Hub Housing Officer will manage approximately 100 homes.

Each Housing Officer will normally be based at their Hub four days a week, available to support and meet tenants of both their sheltered and street properties. We want to promote more events and activities for each Hub, to encourage social connection and access to services – we're already developing some ideas for this but please do let us have your suggestions. The staff list on page 8 shows each Housing Officer and Hub.

We're hopeful that the Hub model can help to build a true sense of community and will be an opportunity to make our housing services better, improve how we listen to and respond to tenant needs, help people to be more active and encourage volunteering.

Our Board set the Trust's values to be Caring, Collaborative, Curious (about different ways of working) and Committed to great outcomes for tenants. We believe the Hub approach will represent these values and greatly improve your services, but will review it as it progresses.

### New faces at the Trust!

We are delighted to welcome Maria Reyes, Derek Gill and Casey Masters to our staff team! Maria returns to us after a spell working in Enfield – we are delighted to have her back and she will manage the Olive Tree House Hub. Derek brings a wealth of housing management and support experience and will be based at Margaret Hill House. Casey, who has worked with us on an interim basis before,



is staying long-term to work at our head office supporting with tenant queries and vital administration duties. Special thanks to interview panel member Andy Fletcher for providing tenant perspective on the appointments.

### **Cost of Living Payment**



On 20th September, the Government announced another Cost of Living Payment of £300. The payment will be made to eligible customers between 31 October and 19 November this year. This is the second of three payments over the financial year totalling up to £900. Eligible pensioner households will also receive a further £300 payment later this year as an addition to the Winter Fuel Payment. Claimants will receive the payments automatically and do not need to contact DWP or do anything to receive the payment.


The DWP is also encouraging low-income pensioners not already getting Pension Credit to check their eligibility, as, thanks to Pension Credit backdating rules, they could still qualify for both the second Cost of Living Payment as well as the third payment due in Spring 2024.







### A very happy **100<sup>th</sup> birthday** to Grace Khiem!

This October we celebrate the remarkable centenary of Grace Khiem, tenant at Abyssinia Court.

Grace grew up in Lahore, India, the daughter of an Irish father and English mother, both serving in the armed forces. She grew up in comfortable surroundings and later got married and had two children. When her daughter was nine months old and her son five years old, her mother became concerned at the unrest following the partitioning of India and Pakistan some years earlier.

"My mother said it wasn't safe to stay and I should look after my children by taking them to England", says Grace.

Her sister had already moved to Chelmsford in Essex, so there would be a place to start a new life. But there was one problem: "My husband really did not want to go", she says, "it was a very hard decision but in the end I felt I had to look after my children".

So in 1960 Grace and her children travelled by boat to England, going first to Chelmsford and then later ended up in Crouch End where she had a flat in Wolseley Road. Life was very different – in India they had help around the house, whereas there was more to do on her own. Also the pace of life was different: "Life in England seemed much faster, everyone was in such a hurry!"



She took a job at a small factory making car battery lids and then at Barry's chocolate factory. Her husband did eventually follow to England but after a while he was very ill and passed away.

Sometime after, Grace was introduced by her brother to a friend to a Hungarian man who was looking for a housekeeper. They eventually married and, while it was a sometimes stormy relationship, she knew it provided her and her family with stability. "Always my main wish was to look after my children" she says. When her husband passed away in 1996, she moved to Abyssinia Court.

It's very clear family is everything to Grace, from the photos on every shelf and even on the cushions, showing her parents, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

She loves being able to live independently and regularly joins in with tenant activities. "England adopted me and I adopted England" she says. "I am very happy".

### New design guide for Hornsey Housing Trust

This summer we have been working with Archio architects on a new design brief for the Trust. The design brief will provide guidance when we are designing new homes, to ensure they include all of the aspects of what is important to us in providing good quality homes.

We have co-produced the document with four tenants: Sue and Violet, who have recent lived experience of new Trust properties; and also Gary and Dan, who have professional technical experience in this area. We also involved our Chair June Barnes and Board member Stephen Ross, both of whom worked for many years with Housing Associations involved with development and regeneration.

The design brief will be used as an internal resource by Hornsey Housing Trust and serve as guidance for appointed design and development consultants and other housing

providers who may be building homes for the Trust.

We carried out some workshops with the tenant group, as well as a site visit to the 'Trees' development in Highgate, built by Hill Homes – itself an exemplary local development of homes for older people.

Additionally, Stephen conducted surveys of tenants in new Trust homes to see how well things were working after four years of living there.

There are five themes of the new document:

- Supporting independence
- Sustaining good health
- Enabling community connections
- Protecting the environment
- Securing affordability


