New in-house repairs service for Hornsey Housing Trust

We are excited to announce changes to the way in which we manage repairs to your home. As you may know, for the past five years we have been outsourcing our service to Newlon Housing Trust and Wates contractors. This contract comes to an end in 2024 and the Board of the Trust has been exploring options for the future.

I have been hearing a lot about repairs issues in my conversations with tenants over the past year, and it is clear that most people would like to see a more responsive and higher quality service. Some tenants who have lived in a Trust home for many years even fondly remember when we used to employ caretakers to attend to everyday tasks.

Our Board has decided to recruit directly employed people to carry out our repairs, starting in summer 2024. These will be multi-skilled operatives, able to do important carpentry, plumbing and other trades in your home.

Backing them up will be a repairs team, people to answer calls and plan the work for the operatives and a manager to oversee the service.

Our cost planning indicates that we can do this for around the same cost per year as the outsourcing arrangements we have had for the past few years.

Our aim is that we will have more direct control over communication and management of repairs, and ultimately, a service that tenants are happy with.

We will still need to use other contractors for more specialised work, but we'll have control over the reporting and management of those repairs too.

We are starting our recruitment process for the service now, and if you know of anyone local who might be keen to work in our repairs service, please do let us know.

As with all important business decisions of the Trust, I'd also like tenants to be involved in interviewing candidates for the new team.

Tenant Satisfaction Surveys 2023

Thank you to all tenants who took part in our survey exercise, which we completed at the end of last year. There is lots for us to learn from and improve upon from the comments that tenants have made about the services of the Trust.

We are preparing a report for tenants with the details of the feedback that we received and plans for action on areas where improvements are needed, which we will issue with our next newsletter to you.

This includes reviewing the *Link* and introducing a new format, to ensure that it continues and improves upon its aim of meeting the needs, interests and activities of tenants.

Your rent and service charges 2024/25

Rents: It is vital that the Trust can set rents to cover our running costs as well as maintain affordability for you. All of our tenancies are set at social rents, the most affordable type of rent.

From April 2024, rents are due to increase, in line with your tenancy agreement and in accordance with government policy. Every year we review rents and apply an increase based on the consumer price index (CPI) and government policy.

Last year, the government capped the social housing rent increase for 2023/24 below inflation, as the cost of living was extremely high. During 2023 inflation has reduced and the government announced in early January 2024 that rents may be increased based on CPI+1%, the usual calculation for rent increases. As a result, the rent increase for 2024/25 will be 7.7%.

Service charges: Service charges are based on the budget for 2024/25 and our estimated costs of providing specified services. Costs may change due to inflation or changes in the provision of services.

Affordability: Inflation and interest rate increases have meant higher costs for repairs and maintenance and providing other services, particularly energy. We recently negotiated contracts for gas and electricity and, while costs have increased, they do represent value for money when wholesale energy prices are still very high. We're also re-procuring other services, including cleaning and gardening, to deliver better value for money.

In considering rents from April 2024, we understand that you face rising costs in many ways, and we need to balance that with the need to improve our existing homes and make them greener and more energy-efficient.

Our Board understands that many tenants have been impacted by rises

in the cost of living and
considers the impact of
increases to both rent and service charges.

Paying your rent remains a core part of your tenancy agreement and enables the Trust to provide services and maintain your homes, while income from service charges pays for the additional services that we provide to you.

If you've any questions about the rent or service charges increases, or are struggling with paying for food or heating or your bills, please do speak to your housing officer. We can provide you with support on claiming benefits, and signpost to other services involved with managing money and debt.

From April 2024, we are also restarting our benefits advice service, which we will confirm details of very soon.

Jess stressed the importance of checking what benefits residents might be entitled to, particularly Pension Credit, which could be worth up to £3,700 per household per year for those on a low income. Jess advised: "Don't be put off if you discover you're only eligible for a small amount of

The charity's Chief Executive Helen Newman, along with colleagues Jess and Joyce, spoke about the 'Haringey Project'. This is a partnership between Age UKs in Barnet, Enfield, Islington and Camden, which aims to extend some local Age UK services to Haringey.

Without a local Age UK charity, Haringey's older residents cannot currently access many of the specialist information and advice services that support older Londoners in other boroughs. However, the special Age UK Barnet session at Abyssinia Court provided an opportunity for residents to get advice from Later Life Planning Team Leader Jess, who answered a wide range of Pension Credit. By claiming it, you may become eligible for other benefits, such as Housing Benefit or Council Tax Support and free TV licences for those over 75 years old."







Palm Tree Court improvements



Following consultation events with Palm Tree Court tenants in 2023, we've invited quotations to carry out the improvements proposed, with local Enfield contractor Gleneast selected as preferred contractor. The work, starting in March 2024, will involve creating a new ground floor 'Hub' for residents, as well as a laundry and office space for staff. In addition, there will be two new flats for social rent, one of which with ground floor access. Outside we'll make improvements to the garden



and parking area next to lceland, and we hope the work will start to help to address some of the antisocial behaviour issues that tenants have had put up with. We will meet again with tenants soon to discuss timescales and other details, but please let me know if you have any questions about the project in the meantime.

Planned improvements for 2024/25

Our board has approved a budget of approximately £1m for planned improvements to our homes in the coming year. With the involvement of Trust tenants who have professional construction experience, we selected consultants Potter Raper to manage the process. They initially carried out surveys of the Trust's buildings, to assess where we need to prioritise replacement of kitchens and bathrooms as well as decoration of communal areas and necessary window renewals.

The properties we selected came from the 'life cycle' data that we hold about properties, which informs us of when these components were originally fitted and need to be checked to verify their condition. Potter Raper surveyed a selection of homes, following which we have planned for 12 kitchen and 32 bathroom upgrades.

In addition, there are several blocks where stairs and corridors and internal spaces need decoration and new floor coverings. These include Hillfield Avenue, Margaret Hill House, Palm Tree Court, Sheba Court, Cecile Park, Dickenson Road, Ferme Park Road and Roseberry Gardens.

We'll also be doing external decoration at Margaret Hill House, Palm Tree Court, Cecile Park, Ferrestone Road, Haringey Park, Harvey Road, Hillfield Road, Rathcoole Gardens and Roseberry Gardens.

Following a tender process undertaken by Potter Raper and interviews again involving tenants, we have appointed ABM Contracting Ltd to deliver the works. It's anticipated that works will be carried out in phases over 2024 and 2025 and if your home is part of the process, we will be in touch soon with more details.

Separately, we're upgrading the intercom systems in 100 homes in 24 blocks. This programme is underway and is anticipated to complete by end of March 2024.

Potter Raper will continue to be involved in managing the contract and inspecting the work as it proceeds, along with the involvement of Trust tenants who have technical experience and have kindly agreed to volunteer their services to ensure service standards are maintained at a high level.
